

Looking at Luke Lectionary Year C

Year C is the year the lectionary readings feature the Gospel of Luke. A vast opinion is that this gospel is the favorite of many Christians. It includes nineteen of the thirty-five parables of Jesus including the Parodical Son and the Good Samaritan. This gospel has the inclusion of the ministry of women as one of its important features.

have read several books on the Gospel of Luke and the Book of the Acts of the Apostles, but I have never read a biography of Luke until I came across a short one from the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America. This article was written to celebrate the coming Feast of the Apostle and Evangelist Luke. His feast day is October 18th.

Saint Luke came from the city of Antioch probably from a pagan family. His youth was seeking after wisdom with a study of the arts and sciences. He managed to travel to quench his hunger for knowledge. In the process he became skilled as a physician and as an artist in painting. He spoke Greek and knew Hebrew and Aramaic.

His skill as an icon painter is well documented with many works attributed to him. A Russian icon attributed to St. Luke was transferred to Russia from Constantinople in 1115. The original seems to have been lost in the ages.

Two theories exist about Luke. One is that he was in Jerusalem at the time of the Crucifixion. It was Luke that traveled with Cleopas on the way to Emmaus on that Sunday morning when Jesus joined them. All was revealed with the breaking of bread. (Luke 24:35) He was in Jerusalem on Pentecost and was moved by the Holy Spirit.

The other theory is that Luke joined up with Paul and that he did not know the Lord during his lifetime. He began his journey with Paul and worked with him as a physician. The fiery words of the Apostle Paul convinced him of the truth that he had vainly sought. Without hesitation he gave up all to join Paul and to become the beloved physician.

Luke and Paul traveled together in visits to the churches that Paul had planted. Luke wrote the Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles as Paul dictated his thoughts to Theophilus, the Governor of Achia. Paul dictated to Luke and Luke

added details which are not found in the Gospels Matthew and Mark.

After the martyrdom death of Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, Luke made his way to Achaia and preached the gospel until his old age. He became a Bishop in Greece and established churches and healed the sick in soul and body.

It is in the tradition of the church that Saint Luke was the first iconographer and that he painted an image of the Holy Mother of God in her early lifetime. These images he painted gave rise to the tradition of the Importance of icons and he is the patron saint of iconographers.

Date vary for the writing of the gospel from 40-60 and the current thinking from 80-90 AD. The source of the material found in Luke is debated. One o the important factors is the claim of Luke's information he got from eyewitness accounts. That seems to give some weight to the text. The only serious mistake is the date of the census.

The School for ministry is a diploma program for second career professionals interested in becoming a deacon and also for parishioners who want a deeper understanding of faith and ministry in the Anglican tradition. Participation in the program does not automatically place a person on an ordination track. This distance program may satisfy certain educational requirements for those interested in a nontraditional, non-credit program route to ordination in the Anglican Diocese of the Southwest, Classes will be offered through Zoom sessions. Students who finish the courses in the program will be awarded a Diploma in Anglican Ministry from the ADSWSM under the certification of the Bishop. Auditing students who complete the program will be awarded a Certificate in Anglican Ministry.

Classes will be offered Monday and Thursday evenings—each meeting lasting 90 minutes, beginning at 8PM CST. No tests will be given, however, classroom participation and papers will be required for diploma students. At the end of each course, students will be assigned a grade of either Pass or Incomplete.

No enrollment or tuition will be assessed for this program, however, students are required to obtain their own textbooks. Fall 2025 enrollment begins August 8, 2025 and closes prior to the first session. Previously enrolled students do not need to reapply. Email Fr. Hal at anglican.sm@gmail.com for an enrollment form.

BACK TO SCHOOL AND MORE!

Our mountains in New Mexico have been blessed with abundant rain this summer. Some places suffered an overabundance and flash flooding! In this newsletter in August of last year, I invited us all to consider images that we might associate with prayer time. The one I shared was about joining God on His front porch for a neighborly visit. I asked if you have a favorite image. I hope you do!

Much as we might like, we cannot sit comfortably on the porch with God forever (when that happens, we will be invited inside). So let us think of images that may help encourage us to get back into action now that the summer months are drawing to a close. Back to school time may not appear in the Bible, but there are Scriptural passages encouraging us to get involved and active.

Luke 10:2 - "And He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the Harvest to send out laborers into His harvest."

2 Cor. 9:6 - "The point is this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully."

Mathew 10:16 - "Behold, I am sending you out as sheep in the midst of wolves, so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves."

We often close our Sunday worship singing the rousing hymn, *Send Us Out*. There are also sayings from everyday life that illustrate our calling to get active:

Christianity is not a spectator sport.

There are only a few coaches. The rest of us are out on the playing field directly involved with life.

We may not be called to work our way into heaven, but let us not ignore the real and immediate needs that surround us.

As the summer ends, how is Jesus calling you to act out your love for Him? The yoke He shares with us is easy and His burden is light (see Matthew 11:29-30). Even so, the most difficult step for us is still the first one, getting started.
