First Harbinger of the Holiday Seasons

Way back in the late 1950s, I was off to college. Maybe in typical fashion in that late summer I changed my mind on the college I would attend and the major I would seek. I would be a geologist rather than an architect. I was also caught up in my reading of books I thought informative. One of them was a book called The Man Called Peter and was a biography of Peter Marshall, an evangelist of recognition at the time. It had a call on my heart to consider the ministry as a profession. I did not act on that call then and am now surprised to find that it I was also reading voraciously came to pass. science fiction. In those days SIFI was closely watched in content. No sex. No politics. No crude language. Just out of this world fantasy of the

future. One of the popular writers I followed wrote in one of his books about religion and its demise over the years. The only remnant was a reference to a virgin woman who had been the mother of someone forgotten. She still had a small following.

The 1950s college experience was one of political call to end segregation. I had grown up with the reality of segregation and yet I was raised to consider myself against the policy and voiced my opinion at rallies on the campus. It had some positive effect.

Now many years later those old long held memories are still part of my thinking today. Is my Christian upbringing significant?

The National election is over with the exception of few Houses and Senate races. The investigation of the voting habits the country are now the focus as political observers try to analyze the results both for and against the results.

The unreported response of the Christian Right, especially the evangelicals, is there but not one of the principal reporters on the news networks looks at the impact. What is the impact of this group? Religious influence in US politics has surged and the Christian voter has had a greater impact on the 2024 election. Two-thirds of the American population are identified as Christian with 55% of them as practicing church attendees at least once a month. The more likely percentile is that these voters will be Republican with the exception of the Black evangelicals. but that is changing.

And the statistics show that these Christians are more likely to vote. The day after the election the unreported consensus is that they, the Christian conservatives, are pleased with the results, but still somewhat concerned with the moral and religious commitment of the elected leadership. This voting block is significant in that it forms a sizable portion of the electorate and votes at a much higher rate than the regular adult population. In addition they tend to vote Republican This gives them an oversized election outcome beyond that of other adult groups. One factor for this voting pattern is that they are from a religious community committed to social, moral, economic, and government issues. This suggests that religion and religious communities shape a portion of the voting With increased immigration and new public. influences this group has come together on a host of political issues linking them as a voting block and a potent factor in elections.

We must use this power wisely in praying for our government and seeking God's will. Let us be humble and pray for a revival of Christian values and for God's wisdom. Let us be <u>thankful</u> for this country and our form of government.

The bishop sees a need for church plants in the larger cities of our diocese. He feels the larger cities are underserved and we do not have a presence in those areas, particularly north of the border. He is very happy with all the small church plants in Mexico, new ones springing up all the time. All church plants are a good thing!!!

The bishop has nominated Theron Walker as the new Standing Committee secretary. He is from the former international diocese and will be joining us shortly.

The bishop will be unveiling a new diocesan seal - one that will include the cross of Jesus Christ, at the Synod next month.

Prayers were requested for the Vera Cruz area of Mexico where there is currently an outbreak of dengue fever - which is a mosquito borne illness.

Prayers were requested for Meredith Omland's 2 yr old niece - Naomi Jade Dircherl. She was born with Esophageal atresia. (baby's esophagus hasn't finished developing.)

ADVENT IS COMING - HE IS COMING!

The Church year will draw to a close at the end of November. By then, we will have given thanks on the National Holiday we call Thanksgiving and, before the turkey is even fully digested, feasted on the best bargains on Black Friday. So if we do not take the time now, in early November, to focus on the massive truths of God (something we might ought to do at least once a year), we will once again get lost in the end-of-year rush of things.

Begin, if you will, with the reality of the *immanence* of God. By that term I mean that the God Who created the entire universe is a real and immediate presence in our lives. If you search online for the meaning of the word "immanence," you will find that it is used in a number of religious belief systems to describe God's presence in our everyday reality. The pantheistic belief, for example, is that God is present in everything tangible. The opposite is the belief that there is no God, or if there is, He simply set off the Big Bang to get the universe going and did not stick around to stay involved or even watch what happened.

My purpose is not to suggest a word study, but to wonder with you about God as we Christians know Him. That He knows us, and we may know Him, is simply magnificent. I suspect that many who doubt Him are unable to accept the idea, let alone grasp its implications for our daily lives. Such a God must be so far beyond, and such as us are so far beneath! Yet we learn in the story of God and His people in what we call Holy Scripture that the God Who created all things created us in His image, created us good. We learn that in our lust for self-determination, we rebelled against Him. We continued to prefer our own sovereignty, yet He continued to love us. He came to Earth to show us the way back, with the Cross of Christ as the bridge over the divide separating us, a divide made ever deeper and wider by our persistent sin. Through the Holy Spirit, He continues to walk with us as closely as we permit. Praying daily helps keep us close to Him. Worshipping weekly enables us to experience His reality in the Sacrament of Holy Eucharist. However, such intimacy with our Creator is not something to be treated casually. Please review in your Anglican Prayer Book the Exhortation found on pages 147-8 (or at anglicanchurch.net). Perhaps we will include it in our Sunday liturgy in Advent. Take it into your hearts as the old year winds down so the new year might dawn, on the calendar, in you, and in me.

Alleluia, He is coming! Alleluia, He is here!
